Butterflies and Butterfly Monitoring Laura Seals, Naturalist

Butterflies are the most easily recognized and beloved insects Ohio has to offer. Dr. Jeffery Glassberg, founder of the North American Butterfly Association, has said, quite fittingly, “Beautiful and graceful, varied and enchanting, small but approachable, butterflies lead you to the sunny side of life.”

Butterflies are members of the order Lepidoptera which means “scaled wing.” Thousands of tiny scales cover each butterfly wing. These often brightly colored scales produce beautiful patterns that, along with a graceful flight, a habit of spending time on equally beautiful flowers and a nonthreatening demeanor, draw many people to these amazing creatures.

Ohio is home to well over 100 species of butterflies and skippers, including two federally endangered species, the Karner blue and Mitchell’s satyr. Though Clermont County does not have quite such a variety, there are over 75 recorded species for the area. As spring turns to summer and the warm months of fall, a parade of butterfly species will be seen throughout the county.

A butterfly’s life begins as an egg laid on a host plant; each species of butterfly has a specific host plant. Some caterpillars will feed on a variety of plants but others, like the monarch, are quite particular about what they eat and eggs will be laid on only a specific type of plant; in the monarch’s case, milkweed. Caterpillars have one mission after hatching from an egg: eating. Most will go through four to six instars as they rapidly grow. Each instar (growth stage) is started by a molt, or skin shed.

The next step of a butterfly’s life cycle is perhaps the most dramatic. After their final instar, all caterpillars pupate, becoming a chrysalis. This stage can last anywhere from a couple of weeks to several months and during this time a metamorphosis, or change, occurs. Inside the chrysalis, the caterpillar transforms into an adult butterfly. After emerging, the butterfly rests and pumps fluids into its wings from its abdomen before they harden and are able to fly away. Adult butterflies feed on nectar, fruit, sap, and sometimes animal feces. Adult butterflies also search out mates before laying eggs and beginning the cycle over again. (Continued on page 3)

Park District News

This past spring has been a busy one for the Park District. It started with the very well attended *Pancakes in the Park* event. Over 300 people enjoyed pancakes with pure maple syrup at Pattison Park Lodge. Volunteers and our naturalists led tours through the sugar bush and the sugar shack to see how maple sap is collected and then boiled down into syrup. Grassy Run Historical Society members demonstrated how syrup and maple sugar were made during the 1800's. Bethel Boy Scout Troop 196 cooked up the pancakes and sausage to hungry participants.



In April we saw the highest attendance ever at the Easter Egg Hunt sponsored by the Batavia Rotary Club at Sycamore Park. Over 700 people showed up on a beautiful Saturday morning which was more than triple the previous years' attendance. A special thanks to Wal Mart for donating the 2000 eggs that the Rotary Club members filled with candy.

May brought a change to the landscaping at Pattison Park Lodge and Gazebo. After a couple years of deer damage, drought stress, and 17 years of growth, it was time to rehabilitate the landscaping in the gazebo area. With the help of Natorp's, a plan was developed that kept our traditional color scheme in place while installing some deer "resistant" shrubs and evergreens. The plant selection will also provide a more finished look to the gazebo area during the "off season".

Another project was put in to place during May. Phase one of the Williamsburg to Batavia Hike Bike Trail is now open with the new bridge crossing Cain Run creek. The first section of the trail will now take visitors from the village of Williamsburg to the East Fork State Park campground.

The Park District is currently finalizing plans for the grand opening of the The James L and Frances Wilson Nature Preserve at Sycamore Park. Check our website at <http://www.parks.clermontcountyohio.gov> for more details this summer.

Butterflies and Butterfly Monitoring (Continued from page 1)

Each butterfly species goes through some variation of this life cycle, though the steps may vary in length. Some butterflies go through each stage rapidly and produce several broods, or generations, a year. Other species will have only one adult brood per year and may spend months as a caterpillar or pupa. Species like mourning cloaks and question marks spend the winter as adults hiding under tree bark or in other protected places.

This year, for the first time, the Clermont County Park District is participating in the Ohio Lepidopterist's Long Term Butterfly Monitoring at Chilo Lock 34 Park. Each week from April thru September, naturalists and volunteers will walk a set route through the park, identifying and counting butterflies long the way. Information collected during monitoring from all sites throughout the state of Ohio will be sent to the Cleveland Museum of Natural History to be processed.

Gathering data on what species are present, in what numbers and at what time of year on a long term basis gives lepidopterists (scientists who study butterflies) an idea of the health of a butterfly species. They are able to see where butterfly populations are thriving, where they might be disappearing and new places they may be colonizing. New populations of unusual or rare species may be discovered and expanding ranges of common butterflies can be noted.

With the installation of the new pedestrian bridge crossing Cain Run Creek, the first phase of the Williamsburg to Batavia Hike/ Bike Trail is now complete. The trail takes users from the end of Broadway Road in Williamsburg to the campground at East Fork State Park.

The project is a collaborative effort between the villages and townships of Williamsburg and Batavia, ODNR - Division of Wildlife, ODNR—Division of Parks and Recreation, US Army Corps of Engineers, and the Clermont County Park District.

Nature Notes

Early June – Bullfrogs and green frogs can be heard in the evenings near ponds, rivers or lakes, calling for their mates.

Mid June – Lightning bugs are prevalent in the evenings. Males flash their lights in a certain pattern to attract females who are hiding on the ground.

Early July – Cardinal flower begins to bloom in the wetland at Chilo Lock 34 Park. Named for its brilliant red flower, it is a popular nectar source for butterflies and hummingbirds.

July – American goldfinches begin their nesting season. They begin nesting much later than most other songbirds, and utilize the downy seeds from thistle plants to line their nests.

Late July – The meadow is in bloom at Kelley Nature Preserve. Visit the preserve to see royal catchfly, purple coneflower, grey-headed coneflower, wild bergamot, and many other beautiful blooming flowers.

August – Katydid can be heard singing their names (*katy-did, katy-did*) in the evenings.

August – Dog day cicadas begin singing during the day. These relatives of the periodical 17 year cicadas are present every summer.


